


Life in the Bush



FAMILY AT THE LUTHERAN SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

I look outside and above acacia trees I see the long necks and heads of giraffes that are passing through the Lutheran School of Theology plot. The Ngong Hills in their vivid green, brown, and bluish gray shades rise to the clouds behind the herd. Today the clouds hang heavy on the hills and seem to be pouring down the side like a giant wave that might rush on top of us at any moment. A steady stream of shepherds with their herds lead their animals towards the seasonal river which continues to



provide water to the community thanks to a dam that was built in the north side of our home. Two mamas wave to me as they finish washing their clothes in the same river and depart with their donkeys. I have to admit I winced yesterday when I



saw a Maasai shepherd first bring his cows in for a drink and then scoop the brown water into his own mouth. I have seen what else those animals do in that river other than drink.

I am learning

to adapt to the new concept of a "home with wide open doors". We do not have a private house where only our family lives, but we share the space with the mission center. Since our move two months ago, we have spent very few nights with the family alone. Not only does the construction crew still work on final touches, but we also had two groups of volunteers who were lodging in and sharing all the meals with us. The mission center was designed so that our family has private rooms upstairs. Downstairs is public: laundry facilities and a guest room, living room for relaxing and devotions, kitchen and dining room for meals and, while the www.lutheransinafrica.com

library building was under construction, the dining space served also as church on Sundays. Our thinking and planning cannot be limited to the family's needs only, but we have set meal and devotion schedules establishing a smooth routine that fits into volunteers' work times.

Our first group of volunteers included my mother and a friend from Finland. They spent two weeks sewing all the curtains for the mission center and even had time to make some seat covers to replace worn out ones.

Merv from Australia put plans together for a vineyard and began fencing the area. Our hope is that in the future we will be able to make our own communion wine and possibly provide it to others depending on how well the grapes produce.



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Jim from the United States helped us to move from our old rental house to the LST. He also did yard work improving roads and helped building a stone wall.

The second group consisted of four gentlemen from Phoenix. They planned and worked on new chicken coops, made great improvements at the guest cottage, organized the tool shed and library books, built shelves, made a shelter for our guard dogs, etc. We are indeed blessed by every helping hand. I am thankful that our children enjoy the "new" normal: having people around all the









time. They like to cook and help with guests' laundry and delight in conversations. God has showered us with his favor by blessing our children so that the guests also enjoy them.

EVERYDAY LIFE AND KIDS' NEWS

Homeschool is a challenge when our home is still a bit of a mess and being worked on. Many a day I feel that I fall short at every front because I cannot put full effort into anything as I am being pulled in many directions at the same time. It is hard to even begin to understand how all this affects my husband since he is wanted and needed at every front. Volunteers need instruction, tools, and materials. Construction



crew has questions. Our own LIA workers bring in their requests. There is an obvious need for a site manager and the interview process has begun. Please pray that we would find a reliable and responsible person to fill this post.

We often finish the school day by lunch time and then they play at the river or look for giraffes. They are getting quite talented at shooting with a bb-gun.

To our delight (and horror) we do not have an unlimited internet package. Without YouTube entertainment, the kids have rediscovered a galore of board games, legos, crafts, and many other creative ways to spend time inside and outside.
