Revered Obare Covers History of Lutheranism in Africa



One of our esteemed professors, Reverend Isaiah Obare from the Evangelical Lutheran Church Kenya, taught the students a history course from the time of the Reformation to the Prussian Union. He additionally discussed the history of Lutheran church in Africa.

Our first year student, Egide Sindayigaya, shared his thoughts about Rev. Obare's class. "I gained so many things from Rev. Obare. I found it very interesting to learn how Lutheranism started and progressed in Kenya and around East Africa. In his introduction, Rev. Obare told us the reason for studying history. We have to know what happened in the past so that we are not surprised by what is happening today. We can better understand how to

solve situations of today, when we learn from the past. I learned how our first missionaries, pastors, and evangelists carried out the work of God in Africa; the work of spreading the Gospel. Rev. Obare discussed what kind of challenges they met in their ministry. Now, we can apply that knowledge to our time when we still deal with similar challenges."

"The early preachers faced troubles with peoples' cultural beliefs that were against the truth of God. People heard the word of God but they mixed it with their traditional religions. This caused hinderances for the Church to grow. I discovered that even when the culture stands against Christianity, we need to hold on to the teaching of



the Bible. We cannot accept practices like sacrifices or polygamy but in a loving way teach our people what the Bible says about these issues. With God everything will be well. When you are a preacher, you have to trust in God when facing bad situations. Even if people backslide to their traditional practices and beliefs, God can bring them back through his word, the faith, and prayer. God can revive those who have turned away from him and bring them back to himself."

When asked about his background, Egide continues, "I am a Burundian born to Roman Catholic parents. I was baptized and confirmed in the Catholic church. When I was about fifteen years old, I received the message from Pentecostal believers. I decided to join them. They don't believe in infant baptism so I was re-baptized. I worked with their pastors and I was trained on how to preach and serve God. But then, five years ago, I heard about Lutheran Church. I got interested in their teaching and soon became Lutheran along with my wife and our three children. I had gotten married when I was in Pentecostal church, but my family followed me to Lutheran Church and now we all belong to Kitega parish in Burundi. We thank God that He brought us to the Lutheran church that teaches the full truth of the Bible! As I was helping and serving in Kitega parish, the church leaders asked me if I would go and study at the Bible school in Kenya. I was interested in going and asked my family about it. I knew that I would come when also my wife was glad that I would study Theology! That is how I ended up in LST."

Big Step in Becoming More Organized

Dr. Sheri and JP Fluellen, a couple from Cheyenne, Wyoming, volunteered at LST with their four children. While the teens enriched the lives of May and Ristau children, the parents shared their business and administration expertise for the betterment of LST. They worked with the LST's managers, Dan and Abigael, developing protocols that improve the effectiveness of security, planting, harvesting, care of animals, meal preparation, and sales. The managers' sentiments lay out some other things that Fluellens were involved in:


"I want to appreciate especially Dr. Sheri Fluellen. She is a wonderful mother, counsellor, confidant,



Peter was also happy to share about himself. "I grew up in a family with nine children living in a small village in Liberia. My grandmother was the one who took me to Lutheran church, but she died when I was fourteen and then I had nobody to take me to the church. During the Civil Wars in Liberia, I fled to Guinea. There, in 1999, I finally found my way back to Lutheran church and was baptized. I helped teaching Sunday school, and I also served as a lay preacher. After the wars, I returned to Liberia. I have a wife and eight children. I am a former principal of a Lutheran Mission School and now I work as a

district superintendent and also as a senior pastor for ELCL."

"I am grateful to study here at the LST. I wish to extend my thanks to Rev. James May and all the donors for establishing such an institution to educate Lutheran pastors for the Great Commission of Christ. I was ordained five years ago without any formal pastoral training other than some short courses that visiting pastors from America came to teach. I would have had opportunities to study in other denominations' schools, but I could not, because I need to study the true doctrine. My dream is to serve in the Lutheran church until I die. At the age of sixty I am seeing it come true! By the grace of God, I promise to teach other Christians in Liberia. So help me God Almighty."


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
